The SIKART Lexicon on Art in Switzerland (<u>sikart.ch</u>) is SIK-ISEA's richly illustrated online reference work on visual art production in Switzerland, managed and regularly updated by an editorial team. It provides content on historical and contemporary artists under the headings artworks, exhibitions, literature and awards. SIKART contains more than 17,000 people-related entries and about 1900 indepth articles.
